



PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Orygen Specialist Program (OSP), a program of Royal Melbourne Hospital, provides comprehensive and integrated specialist mental health services for young people aged 15 to 25 residing in North-Western Melbourne. OSP provides early intervention services to young people with severe and complex mental illness, working alongside Orygen, the National Centre of Excellence in Youth Mental Health (Orygen National) which operates five headspace enhanced primary youth mental health services in the catchment area, along with comprehensive research and knowledge translation programs, policy and advocacy, and digital mental health services.

Specialist clinical streams in OSP offer targeted, evidence-based interventions for psychotic disorders (including young people at 'ultra-high risk' of psychosis), mood disorders, personality disorder, eating disorders, co-occurring substance use disorders, and neurodevelopmental disorders. A dedicated forensic youth mental health stream provides these services in custodial and community youth justice services.

The clinical streams are comprised of multidisciplinary teams that deliver individually tailored services that include assessment and crisis intervention, case management, medication, psychotherapy, family support, inpatient care, group work, vocational support, educational assistance, and intensive outreach.

All OSP programs are supported by the Psychosocial Recovery program, Community Development program, and Orygen Clinical Training Team. Orygen also has acute and sub-acute services that include a 19-bed Inpatient Unit (with 3 dedicated secure youth justice beds), 15-bed Hospital in the Home program, an acute outreach and assessment Youth Access Team, HOPE aftercare program for suicide prevention. Orygen programs value evidence-based practice, cultural safety, and trauma-informed principles, incorporating the diverse needs of all young people and families. This is especially important for those from LGBTQIA+, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander, and culturally and linguistically diverse populations. Responsive and inclusive practices are at the forefront of all care at Orygen.

DEPARTMENT DESCRIPTION

Due to the high rate of mental illness amongst Youth Justice clients and the significant increase in the number of young people entering Youth Justice custody, there is a need for early intervention specialist mental health in this cohort. The relationship between mental illness and offending behaviour in youth is complex but undeniably connected. As such, effective early intervention and treatment of mental health issues is crucial to improving health and social outcomes for young people in or at risk of entering custody.

The Orygen Forensic Youth Mental Health Service (FYMHS) forms part of the specialist clinical programs of Orygen. FYMHS is made up of two separate streams – Community and Custodial FYMHS. The Custodial FYMHS teams are currently located at Cherry Creek, Parkville and Malmsbury Youth Justice Precincts (CCYJP, PYJP and MYJP, consecutively). In December 2023, the Malmsbury site will be closing.

The main objectives of Custodial FYMHS within OSP include:

- Improve the mental health of young people in custody by providing evidence-based specialist assessment and treatment intervention and reduce the risk of reoffending
- Provide services that are integrated with other key custodial and community services to ensure a holistic approach that supports effective treatment outcomes and reintegration to the community
- A key component of this role is to provide effective and timely on-site clinical treatment and case management to young people in custody

The Community FYMHS stream is made up of three (3) different multi-disciplinary sub-teams that provide assessment and consultation only:

Youth Forensic Assessment & Consultation Service (YFACS)

Senior Clinical Specialist and Psychiatrists (Consultant & Registrar) provide primary and secondary **forensic** consultation to clients and case managers from CYMHS/CAMHS services regarding forensic risk and safety planning.

Youth Justice Mental Health Clinician (YJMHC) initiative

Senior clinicians provide primary and secondary **mental health** consultation to clients and community Youth Justice (YJ) case managers at Youth Justice Centres in Broadmeadows, Reservoir, Sunshine and Werribee.

• Children's Court Mental Health Advice & Response Service (CCMHARS)

CCMHARS Senior Clinicians are based at the Melbourne Children's Court to provide primary and secondary **mental health** consultation to the Court and its key stakeholders regarding the mental health of the young person appearing before the Court.

POSITION SUMMARY

The primary purpose of the Senior Clinician - Children's Court of Victoria Mental Health Advice & Response Service (CCMHARS) is to provide clinical assessments of young person's appearing before the Court who present with suicidality or acute mental illness and facilitate timely access to appropriate treatment. Young people appearing before the Criminal Division of the Court and charged with an offence, or subject to Intervention Order or Secure Welfare related proceedings in the Family Division of the Court, are eligible for referral to CCMHARS.

The Senior Clinician - Children's Court of Victoria Mental Health Advice & Response Service (CCMHARS) will draw on a range of evidence-based knowledge areas, in particular forensic psychology, developmental psychology, child psychiatry, and trauma and family inclusive practice.







This Senior Clinician role focuses on providing high level consultation, leadership and advice on complex clinical matters and is expected to have advanced knowledge of and experience regarding the youth forensic and mental health sector.

For referrals to be accepted by the CCMHARS, the person must be charged with an offence and have been served with a Summons, or be on a Bail Order, in the Criminal Division of the Court, or must be subject to Intervention Order or Secure Welfare related proceedings in the Family Division of the Court.


KEY ACCOUNTABILITIES

- Assessment of young persons who appear to be mentally unwell and in need of immediate treatment
- Liaison with, and where appropriate referral to, relevant mental health services
- Assessment of fitness to appear before the court;
- · Assessment of capacity to comply with the demands of a youth justice community-based disposition (including the new youth control order), where the young person may be affected by a serious mental illness
- Assistance with determining appropriate mental health conditions for a supervised community-based disposition (including bail) where the young person is affected by a serious mental illness
- Advising Victoria police nurses, or custodial health services of the need for mental health services
- · Conducting risk assessments (that identify short-term risks up to one month) in the domains of selfharm/suicide. Long-term assessments of risk are not appropriate because CCMHARS will have access to limited information
- Providing information to the court on these issues by means of mental health reports and/or oral evidence;
- · Education and training for courts, legal services and area mental health services regarding forensic mental health issues
- · Contributing to research, service monitoring and evaluation as appropriate
- Take reasonable care for your safety and wellbeing and that of others
- · Work in your scope of practice and seek help where required
- · Work in partnership with consumers, patients and where applicable carers and families
- · Work collaboratively with colleagues across all RMH teams
- Prioritise wellbeing and ensure safe work practices are developed and adhered to in their area

- · Assist the Children's Court in making informed decisions in situations where factors related to mental illness need to be considered
- Undertake mental health assessments in order to determine the presence or absence of serious/acute mental illness, and provide feedback based on these assessments to the Children's Court in a timely manner
- · Assist with accessing appropriate treatment, including liaison with mental health services, when a young person before the court is assessed as having a serious mental illness
- Provide a contact point for Youth Justice workers undertaking initial assessments for suitability for various Youth Justice community-based dispositions and seeking information on previous/current involvement with Mental Health Services, and assist YJ community-based offices with referrals to appropriate local mental health services where a need for mental health support is indicated
- · Undertake liaison with mental health services, Police, Victoria Police nurses, Youth Justice, and Orygen's Custodial FYMHS, about young people assessed by CCMHARS, to assist those services to effectively meet their mental health needs whilst they are in custody
- Provide advice to the court on available options for diversion from the criminal justice system into mental health services
- Capacity building of the Children's Court through provision of advice and education on matters related to youth mental health
- Seek feedback on your work including participation in annual performance discussion
- · Speak up for safety, our values and wellbeing
- Continue to learn through mandatory training and other learning activities

- An approved Degree from a recognised school of Occupational Therapy or other qualifications approved for eligibility for membership of the Australian Association of Occupational Therapy (Vic.).

Psychologists:

Registration as a Psychologist under the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation National Law Act (2009)
with practice endorsement as a Clinical, Forensic or Clinical Neuro Psychologist with the Psychology Board

Essential:

- A minimum of 5 years' experience in the application of clinical practice in the mental health field and specifically with young people experiencing mental health disorders
- An advanced level of skill in assessment (including forensic risk assessment), diagnostic formulation, and treatment interventions for young people presenting with both forensic issues and with mental health disorders.
- A thorough knowledge of current mental health approaches to working with mentally ill clients with behavioural and/or forensic complexity
- Ability to work collaboratively and effectively with CAMHS/CYMHS services
- Capacity to develop effective working relationships, collaborations and partnerships with a range of services within the broader community service system.
- A sound knowledge of the youth justice and/or criminal justice system and other relevant community based forensic services
- Ability to work independently and effectively within a multidisciplinary team, with evidence of sound conflict resolution skills.
- Well-developed interpersonal and communication skills (written and verbal).
- Understanding of the Child, Youth & Families Act (CYFA) 2005 which is the principal legislation for the youth justice service.
- Understanding of the Mental Health and Wellbeing Act 2022, Health Records Act 2001, Privacy Act (1998), Child Wellbeing and Safety Act (2005), Crimes (Mental Impairment and Unfitness to be Tried) Act 1997 and other Acts/ legislation relevant to working with young people in a mental health setting (i.e Sentencing Act, 1991).
- Understanding and acceptance of the Child Safe Standards (2022) and Reportable Conduct Scheme
- Knowledge of relevant guidelines, plans and strategies related to the mental health service system (e.g. Victorian Mental Health Reform Strategy, National Standards for Mental Health Services).
